


What can <u>we</u> do to reverse the destruction of forests and improve the planet for future generations?

"One forest in each county, protected from logging and open to the public."




NETWORK FOREST PROTECTIONS

Old-Growth Forest Network

A forest must be protected from commercial logging to join the Old-Growth Forest Network. Some forests are already well-protected, such as National Parks, but others increase their protection from logging when they join the Network.







Federal Mature & Old-Growth Forest Inventory Estimates



Estimate values drawn from FS-1215a Mature and Old-Growth Forests: Definition, Identification, and Initial Inventory on Lands Managed by the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management. Forest land includes areas meeting the FIA forest land definition. Does not include 3.4 million acres of forested land managed by the Forest Service and 27.5 million acres of potentially forested land managed by the BLM in Alaska. Forest Service wilderness areas and Interior Alaska have not yet been inventoried by FIA but are in progress for inclusion in future inventories.


